## Rector's Report

*... do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God*  
*Micah 6:8*

Dear Friends in Christ,

As I sit to write this report, the words of Micah continue to resonate in my head...*Do Justice, Love kindness, and Walk humbly with your God.* These are all action words that require us act, to undertake, to move in a direction of bringing God's kingdom to the world. The question is what does it mean to do justice, love kindness and walk humbly with our God?

I feel that we are on the right path of doing justice by partnering with the House of Lazarus in a pilot project to provide services for those who require them. This partnership also provides a warming centre for the homeless as well as food for people. It is the kind of ministry that reflects doing justice for those on the margins. Our partnership with Centre 105 is another ministry that serves those in need. We are working at "doing" justice and I believe we can do more and involve more people. As we move into this new year, my prayer is that we will be presented with new opportunities for us all to be engaged in doing justice that we might serve our community as well as those who require the most assistance.

How do we love kindness? First of all, loving kindness means that we must be willing to give and receive kindness. It is not a one way street to make us feel good about ourselves. We must accept the kindnesses that others offer to us. We must also practice extending kindness to everyone, not just those whom are in the circles we already travel. Kindness must be shown to the stranger, the poor, the culturally diverse, the people with whom we disagree or don't understand or have differences with. Kindness is loving our neighbour even when we don't want to. It is learning to transform ourselves to be accepting of all of Gods' created beings as well as all of God's creation. To act kindly means we must put others ahead of ourselves and be willingly to sacrifice some of our own needs to meet the needs of others. It requires us to let go of our own self-interest and become more interested in serving those most in need. This is challenging, but I believe we learning to be kinder to everyone helps us to live our baptismal vows more fully and more completely.

Walking humbly with our God reminds us that we are to be Jesus' hand and feet in this world. In a world and culture that is full of darkness, we are to be the light of Christ, the beacon that attracts others to the way of Jesus. We do this not for ourselves or our own vain glory, but for the glory of God who has given us so much. To be humble means to be forgiving even when those who have harmed us or others are not deserving. To be humble means to show mercy just as Jesus did for the adulterous woman who was to be stoned. To be humble means to provide care and compassion for those who are hurting, or hungry, or homeless or alone. To be humble means to act the way of Jesus even when people aren't looking! Being humble means that we are glad that God is God and we are not!

All of these require action, commitment, and determination. We are called as the people of God to look after those most in need, those who are persecuted, those who are less fortunate than we are. We are called to stand up to the systems that create this oppression and to stand strongly and boldly with those who can stand and speak for themselves. We are called do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with our God. We are the blessed and we need to create blessing for others around us. I pray that each of you will make a commitment to act on your faith and make this place a place where God is seen and celebrated each day in this community.

## WARDENS' REPORT

As we reflect on the past year, it is clear that while pandemics and blizzards create some major challenges, not much stops this Parish from being His hands and feet in the community, to the best of our ability. We are thankful for the leadership and dedication of our incumbent the Reverend Mark Lewis, so ably supported by Wendy Lewis; by the (supposedly retired) Associate Curate Reverend Canon Pat Martin; by our student intern/new member Ruth Speer; by the Reverend Deacon Peter Cazaly with Holy Trinity Chapel; and in the past by the Reverend Canon Fran Aird.

When 2022 started, we were effectively closed with worship being delivered on YouTube and/or Facebook. We have learned that we can function quite successfully virtually, though there is much to be said for face-to-face fellowship and communication. February brought the return to "live" functions, while respecting certain conditions, and since then we have been operating in what might be called hybrid format.

We had many lovely and special services throughout the year, including Easter in April, through the Season of Creation, and Harvest Thanksgiving in the fall. We have returned to PowerPoint for the order of service and song lyrics. The Venerable Peter Crosby led the (belated!) Induction Service for the Reverend Mark on November 20<sup>th</sup>. After service on November 27, MP Eric Duncan presented The Reverend Canon Pat with the Queen's Platinum Jubilee Medal – a well-deserved honour. In December, Pat led the teaching Eucharist (and St. Nicholas's visit, involving chocolate

of course!); we had the Memory Tree; and a visit from Bishop Shane Parker and his wife Katherine Shadbolt. Decorations and other preparations for Christmas Eve were only appreciated on New Year's Day, as the Family Eucharist and 8:00 p.m. Eucharist on Christmas Eve were cancelled due to blizzard conditions and Holy Trinity attendance Christmas morning was very limited.

Miserable weather didn't stop the annual Christmas Day Dinner at the Legion from being wonderfully received by about 200 people, either in person, by take-out or delivered. An incredible amount of work goes into this special event. As one delivery recipient put it, "I can't believe what you people do at Christmas." To Pat, with Elizabeth Irwin, Candace Jamieson, and Ruth Speer and a host of volunteers and donors, thank you for your example and for making Christmas special for many people. Christmas ministries also include gift baskets and the Mitten Tree, thanks to Wendy Lewis' leadership and many contributors.

Martha's Closet resumed, at the Rectory, in February with mountains of stock and has continued through the year with Wendy Lewis leading some hard-working volunteers in supplying those in need of clothing. Martha's Drop-In resumed in March, and has continued to provide lunch or coffee, fellowship, and links to help through the year, again thanks to Pat and her team. Wendy's focus on children and families led to Family Night Out starting in September, giving all, but particularly families, an opportunity to come together for worship, fellowship, and food on a monthly basis.

Christian learning continued in the weekly Gospel study, the Lenten book study, an evening discussion group in June and July, and a further study in July and August. There is an active Education for Ministry (EfM) group and Pat has help as Mark is now qualified to lead EfM as well.

The community enjoyed the Fun(d)raiser play *Murder at the Banquet* in April, and a concert by Village Voyces and Malala in June. The Tilted Steeple Coffee House, relocated to Allan Hall for additional space, resumed its monthly schedule in September, with admission proceeds supporting Community Food Share and food sales supporting us. We offered a delicious apple pancake breakfast to many at the Iroquois Apple Festival in September. We held our first-ever Small Halls concert in October, demonstrating what a lovely concert venue we have and what professional sound and lighting can contribute. We made a busload of folks happy with a soup supper before they attended *Alight the Night* at Upper Canada Village in December, which also "broke the ice" for using our Hall again.

The expanded team of clergy, wardens, treasurer and Synod members all took part in the continued Diocesan *Shape of Parish Ministry* consultation, which culminated in proposals which were accepted by Synod in October. They are focused on strengthening and nurturing Parish ministry, and how we will engage with the world.

The Developing Our Future Task Force is working with Robertson-Martin Architects (RMA), and making some progress on the project. Having reviewed the priorities for the building renovation/expansion, we await RMA's proposals about our options for the future. A Town Hall meeting in October gathered input on how to use the Rectory and the House of Lazarus is now embarked on an exciting pilot project of using it as a community hub and for warming services.

We have a trained Pastoral Care team that provides support for many in the community, as does the Apple Tree Ministry. A small, capable team works hard at managing our three cemeteries to ensure they serve us, are as well maintained as we can afford, and in compliance with provincial requirements. We have a team that does taxes for people who need that help. The Prayer Shawl ministry wraps folks experiencing illnesses in warm hugs. Parishioners (and some who aren't officially) cook, serve, and clean up in support of our ministries and functions, and maintain our lovely gardens in season.

Contributing to our worship we have musicians, lay assistants, the Altar Guild, greeters, readers, communion assistants, counters, folks doing the live streaming, sound board, and overheads, and decorating. Elizabeth Irwin works magic at the roster to pull us all together. Our communications include weekly bulletins and announcements, a Facebook page, a website, and a newsletter. Our dedicated treasurer and envelop secretary keep our finances in order, checked annually by the auditor. Our clergy and dedicated volunteers run the office, and "hold the fort" at St. James, while the Chapel Steward serves Holy Trinity. Our Sexton keeps the church building in good order. And no doubt we have managed to miss mentioning some of our ministries, activities, and volunteers.

As you will also see in the Vestry reports that follow, in spite of pandemics and blizzards and funding and other challenges, our Parish continues to be an active, caring place serving each other and the wider community. As your wardens, we truly appreciate the love, time and talents you share so generously. Thank you. It is a privilege to serve with you.

## **ADULT EDUCATION**

**EfM (Education for Ministry):** We have four participants in year 4 who are set to receive their certificates this spring. **Coffee Morning Gospel Study:** This weekly, one hour conversation about the upcoming gospel reading happens on Tuesday mornings via Zoom. It continues to be a very simple, accessible, informative, and popular practice that helps prepare us for the upcoming Sunday.

**Anglicanism 101:** Prior to Bishop Shane's December visit, we held a 'crash' course about the Anglican church. We looked at our Anglican *via media* (middle way) in light of our history, traditions, theology and liturgy.

Going into 2023, we hope to continue EfM and our Gospel study, and run a Lenten series on *What is the Way of Jesus?*

## **PRAYER SHAWL MINISTRY REPORT – 2022**

In 2022, 19 prayer shawls and baby carrier covers were blessed, and 16 shawls were delivered to people who benefited from receiving them. Prayer shawls are given to individuals who are experiencing any number of difficulties. They may be sick, travelling for treatments, mourning the loss of a loved one, facing end-of-life realities or coping with other problems. Baby seat carriers or smaller shawls are often presented when children are baptized in our church.

People support our prayer shawl ministry by creating shawls or donating yarn or money. Monetary donations are used to buy yarn, print brochures, buy wrapping supplies or laminate prayer shawl tags. Several people in our Parish and beyond lovingly knit or crochet the shawls. Prayer shawl recipients are always most appreciative of these thoughtful and meaningful gifts. They wrap themselves in the warmth of these prayer shawls and know that people care about them and are praying for them.

## **HOLY TRINITY, RIVERSIDE HEIGHTS, CHAPEL STEWARD REPORT FOR VESTRY 2023**

The past year has been a bit more normal than the previous two were - whatever “normal” is for a chapel anyway. Our contribution to the Parish coffers was \$6,266.39. A handsome sum for such a small congregation. In addition, we retained the usual \$3,000.00 in our bank account and deposited \$2,000.00 to the CTF to add to our savings as has become our practice since moving to chapel status.

All of our regulars are back attending worship regularly, and we have even picked up a couple of new congregants over the last four months or so. Our numbers fluctuate on any given Sunday from 12 to 22; weather, vacations, illness and family obligations permitting.

Unlike the terrible upset the broken windows caused in the previous 12 months, not much of a significant physical nature happened to our property during 2022, although we did see the last of our beautiful evergreens in the front yard succumb to an early January, 2023 storm. Thanks to an angel in the form of Don Tryon, all but the stump has been cleared away. You rock, Don!!! We will probably have to get Buster’s Backhoe in the yard while the ground is frozen to pull that out for us.

The “hanging eaves trough” is still a bit of an eyesore, but I have been assured by Dirk Testerink that the job will be on his list for the spring.

It was nice to see Mark at the front of the church for a bit of a change in 2022. I feel this was (and hope will) remind us all that we are one Parish worshipping in two very unique and beautiful buildings.

We continue to support Centre 105 in Cornwall, and were again happy to decorate our “mitten tree”- probably even more than last Christmas. The Centre continues to need breakfast items, especially coffee, on a regular basis, and is always looking for volunteers. This is a mission that is close to ours and Peter’s hearts.

The breakdown of the upstairs furnace (now repaired) forced us to migrate downstairs a little earlier than planned, but we have made the most of it. Unfortunately, the severe storm over Christmas Eve and Day kept most folks from attending that special service. We will remain downstairs during the cold weather in an attempt to minimize the increased cost of heating - our most expensive ticket item by far. We will rise from the depths of the basement in time to celebrate the rising of Jesus from the grave. Just picture it!

I wish to compliment Don Tryon and Wes Long who continue to do a great job with the grass cutting and maintenance of our cemeteries.

### **Details Involving Both Cemeteries**

It is clear that we are incurring a shortfall of at least \$1000.00 each year. We have small investments from which we continue to draw from in the short term, but they will not sustain the cemeteries in the condition to which we have become accustomed. We will be composing a list of email contacts for both St. James and St. John's Cemeteries and sending out a request for funds for the general upkeep of the cemeteries.

The cemetery board contacted three other local cemeteries to obtain their price list for services held at their cemeteries. The board then held a meeting in March to establish a new price list for both St. James and St. John’s cemeteries, due to the fact that the BAO prices for perpetual care increased in January 2022. ## **AUDITED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

### **Community Volunteer Income Tax Program 2022**

The Community Volunteer Income Tax Program is a free income-based program designed to support seniors, single parents, individuals and families with limited or fixed income. There were four Tax Preparers in 2022 providing current year and prior year (up to 10 years) income tax preparation and e- filing as well as support dealing with CRA on individual tax matters. Tax preparers are trained and certified by Canada Revenue Agency and vetted by the RCMP. All tax matters are strictly confidential.

Providing income tax services ensures clients receive the federal and provincial benefits and credits to which they are entitled. We prepared and submitted 192 individual tax filings in 2022.

The program transitioned to over-the-phone service during COVID and remains the preferred option for 2023. One of the Tax Preparers will be at Centre 105 on Friday mornings accepting drop-offs and there will also be a Tax Preparer in the office at Martha's House on Wednesdays for those clients wishing for an in-person by appointment meeting.

### **Financial Highlights of 2022**

- The year finished much stronger than expected. At Vestry 2022, a deficit budget of (\$45,729) was approved. The actual year-end deficit was much lower (\$4,559.98).
- General Givings increased to \$131,811.57 compared to overall General Givings of \$117,875 in 2021. Holy Trinity contributed an additional \$6266.39.
- The Diocese continued to support parishes in 2022 with one-time funding in the amount of \$9,831
- Fundraising improved in 2022 rising from \$2513 in 2021 to \$7560.14 in 2022
- Mission Income also improved in 2022 rising from \$6,000 to \$9,766.
- Investment income increased in 2022 rising from \$7,516 to \$10,667.

## **Financial Challenges in 2023**

- Our Diocese Assessment has increased this year from \$133,879 to \$144,846.
- The deficit budget for 2023 is expected to be (\$13,118) primarily due to the increased assessment
- House of Lazarus is attempting to establish funding to support the payment of utilities, taxes, security and maintenance for their use of Martha's House.
- The renovation account has reserve funds for the Steeple repairs, St James Renovations and the new Hall build but the account may need replenishing from Consolidated Trust Funds if the various projects gain momentum in 2023.
