Incumbent's Report

December 9, 2025

Grace and Peace to you all:

God is good! We have survived another month of busyness and are no worse for wear. It seems that every time I think things are going to get hard or difficult or frustrating, God calms the storms. I am so thankful to be surrounded by a congregation, a group of people, who ground me and remind me that it is not about me and it is about serving others, our community and the world. My joy comes from service, although it can be challenging at times. I am reminded that Jesus was challenged often- by his disciples, by the Pharisees, by the Sadducees and almost everyone he encounters. He depends on the strength, the patience and the courage provided by God. How can I do anything less?

We have begun a new liturgical year, and it always begins with Advent....my favorite time of year. It is my favorite liturgical season because I love the color blue and I like to get and be prepared. Advent is a time of preparation; a time of getting ready; a time of anticipation for the coming of the Lord. The preparations that take place in our culture today is about spending more on frivolous things rather than spending time with one another. This time of preparation in our culture tells us to buy more for those who already have rather than buy for those who have not. Our culture tells to think about ourselves rather than others. The rich get richer and the poor get poorer. When will love prevail?

Jesus urges us to follow him and his example. This tells me that is always about others and never about myself. I would encourage you to consider purchasing a meal or something on the Amazon Wish list for Centre 105 to give as a gift to one of your friends. Or perhaps buy a part of a farm or the whole farm from Alongside Hope, formerly PWRDF, to give as a gift for a loved one. Or donate to the Community Foodshare as a gift to your family. We only teach Jesus' love for others by being examples of that love for the people in our society who live on the margins. Making their lives better makes our lives better. We need to prepare the world for the love of Christ and that doesn't happen through indifference.

As we continue through the Advent Season let us remember the four themes of Hope, Peace, Joy and Love. These are powerful words for us to live out in our daily lives. How do we share these themes with others and how do we find them for ourselves? I think it is by being prepared. I was once taught that by failing to prepare, I was preparing to fail. There is some wisdom in those words! I hope you continue your preparations, through this Advent Season and beyond, to meet Jesus and stand before God with a full heart knowing you loved God, loved your neighbour and loved yourself.

I love this place and as always, it is an honour and a privilege to be the incumbent here. May God continue to work through us all to bring the kindom of God to the world and to this community.

The Reverend Mark Lewis led our 5 Eucharist services for November. The service on November 2 was a celebration of All Saints, and the baptism of Walker Mulvihill. There was an opportunity to light a candle or place a pebble in memory of loved ones. On November 9, Pentecost 21, service opened with an Act of Remembrance and the singing of O Canada. November 16 was Pentecost 23. Pentecost 24, on November 23, was service for the Reign of Christ, before our beginning of Advent on November 30. The service included the lighting of the candle of Hope. Coffee and treats and conversation were welcomed before the services. Service at the Hartford Retirement Home was on November 4th. Many people in such a variety of roles contribute to our lovely worship services at St. James' and at the Hartford and we really appreciate all the contributions made.

The Zoom Facilitated Coffee Morning Gospel Conversations continued on November 4th, 11th, 18th and 25th Tuesday mornings. Thanks to the Reverend Canon Pat Martin for coordinating – and facilitating - the discussions of the Gospel for the coming week.

Education for Ministry session were held at the church on the afternoons of November 4th and 18th.

The always appreciated Martha's Drop-In Lunches were held in the church on November 6th and 20th. Thanks to all who prepare, serve and clean up for this popular ministry.

Martha's Closet set up the Christmas decoration exchange in the (former) dungeon so parishioners could bring in the decorations they no longer want and go home with ones they like. The decorations become available to all clients of the Closet, along with their clothing choices. The size of the stock makes set-up and take-down a challenge, and the size of our Hall and the various functions held there mean we can't leave the clothes out. And then there is the question of storage! Thanks to all of you who serve the community in this much-appreciated ministry.

November 10th saw a morning of work to prepare food for the Martha's House, aka the Hub, to be given to folks who need a meal or more to take with them after a visit to the Hub. Thank you Ruth for getting this off the ground!

Wendy Lewis got us organized for a sale of home-made (well, church made – always excellent from St. James'!) tourtières. Thanks to all the volunteers who contributed contents, and to those who made the pies on November 25th, 26th, and 27th. They were frozen unbaked and ready for pick up on November 30th. The tourtières are a great way to make holiday entertaining easier!

Also thanks to Wendy for her on-going coordination of our Christmas Exchange, almost wrapped up (no pun intended) with just a couple of items still needed for the bags for individuals who could use a little help.

Was it Ruth that coordinated a clean-up of the un-homed jackets and sweaters in our coat rack by the west door? We appreciate the help in making the entrance more welcoming.

There always seem to be more prayer shawls being dedicated. Thank you to Joyce Millard and Judy Lapensée for their work on this ministry that brings a real warmth to folks who need it.

We appreciate the work of the folks cleaning up our parish list. A job not to be envied!

We were saddened to hear of the passing of Ethel Armstrong, on November 17th at the Southbridge Home in Kemptville. Martha's Closet Correspondence

Our Current Situation:

In November we had a couple of events in the downstairs hall which meant we had to do a quick teardown of the racks and things in the downstairs hall. We had left the racks out after the October Closet thinking we would get a quick start on the donations that tend to arrive on the day of a Martha's Closet.

The wonderful thing about Martha's Closet and our steady crew of volunteers is that they know what to do and will come when the church is open and work their way through the clothing donations. The downfall in this is then we do have a tendency to take over the hall.

This past month highlighted to us that we need a better plan as we are aware the hall is a shared space for many different things throughout the year, it doesn't only belong to Martha's Closet. The Hub needed a space for a 2 day training session they were having. Our parish was asked to host the funeral lunch for the Becksted family on Nov. 28th, the day right before Martha's Closet. These events along with the fact that we were at the last Martha's Closet for 2025, we decided to meet following the Nov. 29th closet to brainstorm options and ideas. We were grateful that Mark was able to join and helped facilitate the conversation.

With regular events continuing to happen in the parish and new things coming our way, like the quarterly South Dundas Chamber of Commerce breakfasts, we realize we need to direct our thoughts on how to best manage our use of the hall and the space we have downstairs. This month highlighted that we need to be flexible and communicate well with all parties involved, and having the ability to pivot quickly is key.

We talked about two possible areas that could be considered for staging and sorting. One was the dungeon and the other being the children's room next to our Martha's Closet room. The consensus amongst the group is the children's room would be the better of the two options. It is closer to the lift as the donations arrive and is right next to our Martha's Closet room where the coats are stored and the clothing racks are kept.

Our Ask of Parish Council:

We are hoping Parish council would consider allowing us to look at the children's room and come up with a plan on how to make good use of that space. The plan would be to create a multi-use space. We would keep some children/family materials and resources and determine if there would be space to store incoming clothing donations as well as space for the volunteers to work on sorting. The other event that happens annually is the collection our parish does for the Community Foodshare Christmas exchange bags. This is done through the leadership of Wendy Lewis and in 2025 the collection was ongoing throughout the year. This allows our community to donate items as they find them, perhaps at a cost savings. This means we are storing the items as they come in and therefore having a dedicated space for this must also be factored in our plans.

Our Commitment:

The first step would be to do a cleanup and organize the space, clearing out what we know isn't needed and identifying the things that need to be kept. There are items that could possibly be put out in the annual spring yard sale.

We also have some work to do in clearing out a couple of our older "homemade" racks and which will allow us to have a more organized space in our main "Martha's Closet" room. All of this effort will help to make Martha's Closet preparations, setup and teardown more streamlined and efficient.

The one thing all of our Martha's Closet volunteers agree on, this is a vital ministry that is helping our community. It isn't only clothes that are given away on a Saturday morning, there is fellowship and friendship amongst all involved in the Martha's Closet ministry. We have our downstairs and upstairs volunteers. On closet mornings we have a capable team in Pat Martin, Fay Donnelly and Ann Barkley. They are available to support those who come into the church not only for clothes, but also for conversation and pastoral care. The coffee and treats are available as well.

We are grateful for the support of our parish community, without it, this ministry that Wendy Lewis started back in 2017-2018, taking boxes of clothes in the back of her SUV to the local laundromat would not have grown to become what it is today.
